What do you need to graduate from high school?

## 18 compulsory credits

Students must earn the following compulsory credits to obtain the Ontario Secondary School Diploma:

4	credits in English (1 credit per grade)*
3	credits in mathematics (1 credit in Grade 11 or 12)
2	credits in science
1	credit in Canadian history
1	credit in Canadian geography
1	credit in the arts
1	credit in health and physical education
1	credit in French as a second language
0.5	credit in career studies
0.5	credit in civics

### In addition, students must complete:

✓	12 optional credits†
✓	40 hours of community involvement activities
✓	the provincial literacy requirement

Plus one credit from each of the following groups:

1	<b>Group 1:</b> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>• English or French as a second language**</li> <li>• a Native language</li> <li>• a classical or international language</li> <li>• social sciences and the humanities</li> <li>• Canadian and world studies</li> <li>• guidance and career education</li> <li>• cooperative education***</li> </ul>
1	<b>Group 2:</b> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>• health and physical education</li> <li>• the arts</li> <li>• business studies</li> <li>• French as a second language**</li> <li>• cooperative education***</li> </ul>
1	<b>Group 3:</b> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>• science (Grade 11 or 12)</li> <li>• technological education</li> <li>• French as a second language**</li> <li>• computer studies</li> <li>• cooperative education***</li> </ul>

\* A maximum of 3 credits in English as a second language (ESL) or English literacy development (ELD) may be counted towards the 4 compulsory credits in English, but the fourth must be a credit earned for a Grade 12 compulsory English course.  
 \*\* In groups 1, 2 and 3, a maximum of 2 credits in French as a second language can count as compulsory credits, one from group 1 and one from either group 2 or group 3.  
 \*\*\* A maximum of 2 credits in cooperative education can count as compulsory credits.  
 † The 12 optional credits may include up to 4 credits earned through approved dual credit courses.

<p>Mixed (M)</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li><input type="checkbox"/> University/College preparation courses are offered to prepare students to meet the entrance requirements of certain university and college programs.</li> <li><input type="checkbox"/> Focus on both theory and practical applications.</li> </ul>	
<p>University (U)</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li><input type="checkbox"/> Provide students with the knowledge and skills needed to meet entrance requirements for university study.</li> <li><input type="checkbox"/> Emphasis on theoretical aspects of course content with supporting applications.</li> </ul>	
<p>Workplace (E)</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li><input type="checkbox"/> Workplace preparation courses prepare students to move directly into the workplace after high school or to be admitted into select apprenticeship programs or other training programs in the community.</li> <li><input type="checkbox"/> Focuses on practical workplaces skills.</li> <li><input type="checkbox"/> Only available in Math at MPC.</li> </ul>	
<p>Academic (D)</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li><input type="checkbox"/> Focus on development of knowledge and skills through theory and abstract thinking as a basis for future learning and problem-solving.</li> <li><input type="checkbox"/> Prepares students for grade 11 &amp; 12 courses at the university, university/college and college levels.</li> </ul>	
<p>Applied (P)</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li><input type="checkbox"/> Focus on essential concepts and development of knowledge and skills through practical applications and concrete examples.</li> <li><input type="checkbox"/> Prepares students for grade 11 &amp; 12 courses at the university/college or college levels.</li> </ul>	
<p>Locally Developed (L)</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li><input type="checkbox"/> Courses that are developed locally to meet educational and career preparation needs of students.</li> <li><input type="checkbox"/> Prepares students for grade 11 &amp; 12 workplace courses.</li> <li><input type="checkbox"/> Only available in Math at MPC.</li> </ul>	
<p>Open (O)</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li><input type="checkbox"/> Designed to broaden students' knowledge and skills in subjects that reflect their interests.</li> <li><input type="checkbox"/> Courses do not have specific requirements and prepare students for active participation in society.</li> </ul>	

# POST-SECONDARY PATHWAYS

**APPRENTICESHIP** – Students can begin an apprenticeship while still in high school through Ontario Youth Apprenticeship Program (OYAP). Monarch Park students can access OYAP through taking Co-operative Education courses in grade 11 or 12. [www.oyaptdsb.com](http://www.oyaptdsb.com)

**COLLEGE** – Offer certificate, diploma, advanced diploma and degree programs. Students require grade 12 English at College or University level. Programs may have other course specific pre-requisites or supplementary requirements. [www.ontariocolleges.ca](http://www.ontariocolleges.ca)

**COMMUNITY LIVING** – Youth with a developmental disability live and/or participate in an integrated community. Within the community the youth contribute to the community by learning situational-specific life skills that aid them in better navigating their shared experience. [www.cltoronto.ca](http://www.cltoronto.ca)

**UNIVERSITY** – Offer degree, master and doctorate programs. Students require English at the grade 12 University level as well as 5 additional credits at the grade 12 University or Mixed level. # SUMMER SCHOOL

# DUAL CREDITS

Dual credits are an opportunity for students to take a college credit course while still being a high school student. Students will earn both a college and a high school credit and will attend the college for a half day each week. Information about Dual Credits will usually be available for September 2019 by the end of April. Students must be 16 to enroll in a Dual Credit course. - Once courses have been submitted they cannot be changed. If there is an error students can contact their guidance counsellor to allow for re-submission.
